

#### The New Archive Project

In the last Newsletter, we spoke of our plans for expanding the GHS archival collections to include more recent materials. For the sake of convenience, we will administer two archives separately:

The Georgeville Historical Archive, 1797-1918 The New Georgeville Archive, 1918 to the present day.

The former, which is already extensive, will continue to be curated by John Scott ably assisted by John Boynton and several other GHS Directors.

The New Archive will be coordinated by Aileen Desbarats (Documents, Records and Ephemera) Judy Bachelder (Photos) Valerie Pasztor (Tapes and Oral History). We are in the process of setting up effective management systems and databases so that our collections can be easily accessed by future researchers. Do consider entrusting us with materials that will contribute to our record of the life and times of the Georgeville area.

#### These old stones

Four of the Georgeville Historical Society's directors attended a conference at the Granit Museum in Stanstead on Wednesday, 28th May, 2008, organized by the Quebec Anglophone Heritage Network and moderated by Matthew Farfan. It considered the problem of those abandoned and neglected rural cemeteries scattered over the parts of the province originally settled by Englishspeaking pioneers. Concerned individuals, some of them members of local historical societies, continue to trace the location of small, almost forgotten burial grounds, reminders of our Anglophone heritage. In our area we know of four: the Magoon Point, Hill, Bodwell and Judd's Point cemeteries, all overgrown with trees and containing toppled and broken stones dating from the early 1800s.

The 70 or so people who attended heard Matthew Farfan introduce the subject. Dwane Wilkin spoke about the problem of obtaining funds to cover the cost of restoring and maintaining these cemeteries, and the possibility of obtaining funds for that purpose from the provincial Department of Culture and Communication. Heather Darche described the work of the Missisquoi Historical Society, which provides in its budget a considerable sum to cover the cost of looking after the many such cemeteries that it has adopted. Finally Charles E. Marchant of the Vermont Old Cemeteries Association gave a slideshow presentation of the various problems encountered in the restoration of old cemeteries and how they are dealt with, followed by a demonstration of techniques for repairing broken stones. Should our society decide to take under our wing one or more of the four cemeteries in our area, the knowledge we gained at the conference will be invaluable.
